At the 2016 Illinois Farm Bureau Annual Meeting in Chicago, the Young Leaders Discussion Meet offered innovation and thought on issues facing America's farmers and ranchers. Lynn Doran originally became interested in the competition when our Young Ag Leader (YAL) Reid Thompson, who is the District 12 Young Leader Director, encouraged her to attend/compete at the District Discussion Meet. The District Discussion Meet was held at the Piatt County Farm Bureau office and was comprised of districts 11 and 12, Doran leaving as the District 12 winner.

Reflecting on the district competition, Doran says it was a friendly, fun experience that was inviting, and not intimidating. The event was a great opportunity for networking with other neighboring counties where Doran was able to learn more about their county programs. Doran mentioned the event provided a foundation for public speaking that helped improve communication skills.

Preparation for the state discussion meet was not a "walk in the park", as Doran studied for 10-15 hours. Studying general items to be discussed at the meet, Doran said she studied different areas of all the provided topics to know them in-full, being prepared for multiple directions of discussion. Doran restated that this is a discussion, which is won by studying and learning about the topics' role in agriculture.

While competing in the state discussion meet, Doran noted that she felt stronger as she advanced that day. When she got to the final four, Doran said her hard studying paid off. She felt it was the easiest question/topic of the day, a topic Doran felt she had a great handle on. "The other three competitors were great speakers who shared great ideas", said Doran.

Winning the Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leader Discussion Meet left Doran with a prize 4-wheeler, which she is excited to receive. Doran will go on to compete in Phoenix, Arizona at the American Farm Bureau Federation Discussion Meet representing Illinois Farm Bureau.



Fisher FFA Installs History and Award Wall



The Fisher FFA recently installed an award and history wall in the agricultural education classroom created by FFA member and Vice President, Sophia Hortin. The purpose of the wall is to highlight the history of the Fisher FFA during both its original charter and since its reestablishment in 2011. The wall also gives credit to those students and teams who have achieved honors at the section and state level by displaying the plaques awarded at such events. At the heart of the wall is the FFA jacket of Leland Glazebrook, former FFA member of the Fisher FFA chapter during its original charter. Glazebrook was a significant leader of the Fisher FFA and Illinois State Association, serving as Illinois State Reporter in 1938-1939 and Illinois State President in 1939-1940.

Glazebrook received the FFA jacket, now on display in the Fisher agricultural education classroom, when he attended the FFA National Convention in Kansas City, MO, as he served as Illinois State President. According to the Illinois Association FFA history, Leland Glazebrook received two jackets, purchased by J.E. Hill. Those jackets were the only two FFA jackets in Illinois at the time. Also highlighted on the wall are past advisors, reaching back to Carl A. Bell in the 1930s-40s to current advisor,

Jennifer Boberg. The incredible history of the Fisher FFA during its original charter includes chapter-wide projects, coast-to-coast road trips, father-son banquets, air tours, state representation, the construction of a new agriculture education shop, and so much more! The display is not limited to past achievements. It also includes awards from Section 17 public speaking and horse judging competitions, state scrapbook certificate, and the Fisher FFA re-charter certificate.

Sophia Hortin, who put together the display wall puts it best, "We're a young chapter, so it may not seem like we have a rich history since we were just reestablished in 2011, but if you dig deep enough for information it's encouraging and fun to learn about the original roots of which or chapter originally came. That's why I made the display, to showcase the achievements and amazing things we have done in the past to serve as encouragement so that every year we might build a little more to become just as great a chapter as what Fisher had been in its original years." So, the Fisher FFA hopes to add to this wall of history and achievements for years to come and for it to serve as a reminder of what was and as inspiration to present and future members to reach for success in all they do.



Snow Days and Seeds of Opportunity By: Kirk Builta, Executive Director Opportunity

In a hand written letter dated March 2003, Marguerite Winston expressed her interest in providing scholarship opportunities to local students. Her letter, sent to the Champaign County Farm Bureau Foundation, expressed her desire to "plant seeds" of opportunity for students, just as farmer's plant in

the rich soil of Champaign County.

The letter tells of Winston's desire to "brighten things up" and make a difference on a cold and snowy central Illinois day. It was that early March snowstorm which inspired yearly donations by Mrs. Winston and the annual scholarship in her name. The scholarship was a fitting tribute to the agriculture industry which Winston, and her husband Willis, were a part of. Mrs. Winston was no stranger

to the CCFB Foundation. Winston's daughter, Ellen Stonner, was a member of the Foundation's Board of Directors.

"The trees are bare; it looks as if spring is not in the near future.... The thought crossed my mind, "why don't you do something that will make a difference and brighten things up? So that's what I did... I planted a seed."

 Dated March 2003. Although these scholarship funds did indeed "brighten" the future of Champaign County students, Mrs. Winston's influence has extended much farther.

It was Mrs. Winston's investment in the future that inspired others to become involved in the Foundation's efforts. Foundation records show that it was in September of 2004, when the Champaign Women's Club, a group of which both Winston and Stonner belonged, endowed a scholarship with the Foundation. The Champaign Women's Club Scholarship was formed over a decade ago, and has financially supported the education of a Champaign County students pursuing a degree in agriculture. This \$20,000 investment now represents a nearly century old tradition of philanthropy by members of the Women's Club.

That tradition of philanthropy

continues as the Champaign Women's Club honors Marguerite F. Winston with a new gift to the CCFB Foundation. The Marguerite F. Winston Endowment will stay true to Winston's desire to brighten the world while advancing the Foundation's mission of educational opportunities in agriculture.

Women's Club member Pat Carrington tells us that Winston's lifetime commitment to the Champaign Women's Club, and our community, has not gone unnoticed. Their club recently voted to honor Winston, and in turn her family, though this gift to the Foundation.

The Foundation Board of Directors and staff appreciate the Champaign Women's Club's commitment to our organization and the join Club members in honoring the vision and generosity of Marguerite Winston.

Foundation Launches 2017 Scholarship Program

As demand for agricultural professionals grow, one in seventeen careers in Illinois are directly related to agriculture; and in Champaign County alone, the industry boasts an employment of nearly 2,800 residents. Driven to support an industry thirsty for agricultural professionals, the Champaign County Farm Bureau Foundation provides scholarships to local students pursuing a college degree in an agricultural or related field of study.

In addition to enrollment at an accredited college or university in an agricultural or related curriculum, successful applicants must maintain exceptional academic performance as well as community and school involvement. Applicants must be Champaign County residents and/or graduates (or graduating High School Seniors) of a High School located in Champaign County. Ultimately, the most qualified applicants will work to make a positive impact on future of the agricultural industry.

Foundation Executive Director Kirk Builta says it's important for all college-bound students to consider studying agriculture and applying for Farm Bureau Scholarships. "Agriculture has always been more than combines, corn, and cows. The industry is thirsty for new hires in a variety of different career paths. This year our students are studying food science, engineering, meteorology and other agricultural-related degree paths."

Scholarships of no less than \$1,000 will be awarded to top candidates. Scholarship applications can be found on the Farm Bureau Foundation's website and are due no later than

March 1st, 2016. Visit www.ccfb-foundation.com/scholarship to apply.

Additional scholarship opportunities exist for Champaign County students pursing a degree in agriculture. Children of farm families throughout Champaign, Ford and Vermilion Counties are qualified for the Freese Memorial Scholarship provided by the Immanuel Lutheran Church in Flatville. This scholarship is administered by the CCFB Foundation and awarded by the Church. Illini FS Nutrient Stewardship

The end of a calendar year brings with it reflection on what was accomplished with nutrient stewardship. Taking inventory of what worked, what didn't, and what remains to be discovered helps us with the planning process with the start of a new year. It is about charting the course for continued learning and how to improve nutrient stewardship through farm profitability. Sustainability is possible through profitability. A look back over the year helps us appreciate all that was accomplished, which helps define what is yet to come. Here is a list of several project over the past year. Although not inclusive of all stewardship projects or events, it provides a look at the emphasis production agriculture has placed on nutrient stewardship in East Central Illinois.

Nutrient Research and Education Council (NREC). A total of 36 projects related to nutrient research and stewardship were submitted for consideration in October, 2016. Of the 36 projects, 17 were projects seeking renewal (multi-year projects) and 19 new submissions. All the renewals were awarded funding for 2017 and 6 of the new submissions also received notice of funding for 2017. No other state in the Midwest offers such a program that supports production agriculture research and/or Outreach efforts. Hats off to those dedicated individuals and farm organizations that made the Nutrient Research and Education Council Program possible as well as the council members that dedicate time to making the decisions on which projects to fund. Hats off to the farmers of Illinois that fund the program through the fertilizer check-off. Everyone's investment will continue to demonstrate agriculture's commitment to improved nutrient stewardship.

Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association (IFCA). The first local Maximum Return to Nitrogen (MRTN) recommendation will be available to Lake Springfield area farmers for the 2017 corn crop. The "first-of-its-kind" local N recommendation was made possible through the effort of IFCA and the Department of Crop Sciences at the University of Illinois as well as financial support of Springfield City Water, Light and Power and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. Work is underway in other local priority watersheds to "localize" similar N rate calculations. Visit www.ifca.com and click on "Keep It for Our Crop" for more information about local MRTNs and other stewardship efforts offered through IFCA.

Illinois Farm Bureau and GROWMARK Inc. are working with 14 county Farm Bureaus and 11 FS companies to demonstrate local nutrient stewardship. The Four R For You (4R4U) pilot program focuses on field demonstrations and studies to provide practical solutions and information to local farmers. The four Rs refer to the right source and rate of fertilizer applied at the right time and place. Visit www.ilfb.org and search for "Nutrient Pilot Program" for more information.

Nutrient Stewardship Grant Program. Eighteen Illinois county Farm Bureaus have been awarded grants under Nutrient Stewardship Grant program. Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) has awarded the grants – totaling more than \$99,000 – for the second consecutive year to help promote local nutrient stewardship, soil health and water quality projects.

Illini FS and Nutrient Stewardship. Illini FS will be working with Champaign County Farm Bureau and a pilot group of farmers with a new Nutrient Stewardship Project. project revolve around the four pillars of the Illini FS Nutrient Stewardship Program, Assess, Plan, Learn, and Commit. The goal of the project is to refine the program for a full launch into the 2018 growing season. The program is designed to help local farmers create their own Nutrient Stewardship message, a message that will help define individual efforts to improve nutrient stewardship while focused on farm profitability. Illini FS has also launched a program to work with local high school ag teachers and ag students to emphasize efforts to improve nutrient stewardship at the farm gate and to make the students a part of the learning and outreach efforts. Watch for more information about how Illini FS is working with our young, future leaders of production agriculture. Energy Market Update

After a lull in holiday trade through the first of the year, look for a pull back in energy markets during January or February. Spring weather allowing farmers to get into the fields typically sparks a strengthening in the market come March or April. Now through Valentine's Day is a great time of the year to get your energy contracts in place. OPEC has been in the news lately, agreeing to cut production. If OPEC follows through with a cut in production in January we could see an increase in the price of crude oil. We will be keeping a close eye on OPEC and the markets.

Looking at the big picture, there are still very attractive prices if you need to contract or layer.

Resolution Submittal Outcome

My year and a half study of 'creativity and innovation in education and business' generated my idea to get discussion going on the topic, and Illinois Farm Bureau is the largest gathering of policy makers in the state other than the legislature! Many school board members, and spouses of school board members come to Chicago for the annual meeting.

The key initial group at CCFB is the committee that puts together tool shed meetings. Ideas are sifted from what surfaces at those, and those ideas get passed on to the legislative committee and board. That is more sharing of an idea. Submitting the idea to the Tentative Resolutions Committee of Illinois Farm Bureau brings more consideration, more discussion. The idea was accepted, but how to get wording right for policy was a challenge. The subcommittee passed it on to the full TRC, and approval for presentation to the 346 delegates...

The submittal on Civics was generated by a recognition of how civics education has changed in our schools. My dad's high school civics textbook, late 1920's, was a shocker! Much more involvement of students with government, starting with village boards. Studies on knowledge of significant aspects of our government show poor understanding of even college students. Step one of a problem is to make people aware of the problem, identify it.

While CCFB asked for a survey, the TRC amended the submittal by only asking for 'increasing engagement of students in local, state, and federal activities in an effort to gain a better understanding and knowledge of the political process and the importance of civic engagement."

Both policies were approved by the Delegate Body without discussion. Now part of IFB policy, Officers and staff of IFB will work with legislators and other leaders to draw attention to the issues
