This Week's Hot Topics

- RIVER UPDATE CME Group on Thursday lifted Illinois River terminal 'force majeure' for corn and soybean futures deliveries.
- AVIAN FLU Sen. Chuck Grassley of Iowa says he's disappointed that the Obama administration has turned down Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad's request for a presidential disaster declaration to help the state's poultry producers recover from losses due to highly pathogenic avian influenza.
- CALORIES ON MENUS The <u>Food and Drug Administration</u> is giving restaurants and other food purveyors an additional year to comply with new rules that require calorie counts on menus. The new deadline in December 2016.

- WHO'S WELL OFF On a global scale, the vast majority of Americans are either upper-middle income or high income. And many Americans who are classified as "poor" by the U.S. government would be middle income globally, according to a new Pew Research Center analysis.
- FARM PROFITABILITY According to <u>USDA's Economic</u> Research Service, 79% to 86% of retirement, off-farm occupation, and low-sales farms are in the "red zone", indicating a very low return to farming. The share of farms in the red zone drops rapidly for the remaining family farm types, those with moderate sales and higher.
- NO ANTIBIOTICS Meatingplace.com reports Perdue Farms announced it is now raising more than half of its chickens without antibiotics of any kind and will launch six new national television ads featuring Jim Perdue discussing the company's progress on reducing antibiotic use in poultry.
- BIG DAIRY Chinese and Russian investors are collaborating to build a 100,000-cow dairy the largest in the world in northeast China to supply milk and cheese to the Russian market. That's more than three times larger than Fair Oaks Dairy in Indiana.

- CARDBOARD CHECKOFF <u>Manufacturers of building</u> <u>products</u>, paper and cardboard are trying to recast consumers' negative perceptions about their industries by establishing a program similar to agricultural checkoffs.
- MIDDLE CLASS Pew Research says only 16% of the world's population was living on \$20 or more daily, a little above the U.S. poverty line. By global standards, that constitutes an uppermiddle or high-income existence.
- EL NINO The National Weather Service says there's a greater than 90% chance that El Niño will continue through Northern Hemisphere winter 2015-16, and around an 80% chance it will last into early spring 2016.
